

A JOINT RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO REPAIRS IN THE
WARD AND ENGINE HOUSE, IN WARD TWO.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the committee on lands and buildings be requested to investigate the sanitary and other conditions of the ward and engine house in Ward two, determine what should be done to remedy such conditions, procure estimates of the cost of such changes and repairs and report thereon at the December meeting of the city government.

A JOINT RESOLUTION MAKING ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION
TO BE CREDITED TO INCIDENTALS AND LAND DAMAGE,
PRINTING AND STATIONERY, CITY POOR AND DEPENDENT
SOLDIERS, CITY.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) be appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, and credited to the account of incidentals and land damage, and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) be appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated and credited to the account of printing and stationery; and the sum of five hundred fifty dollars (\$550) be appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated and credited to the account of the city poor; and the sum of one-hundred fifty dollars (\$150) be appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated and credited to the account of dependent soldiers, city.

A JOINT RESOLUTION INSTRUCTING THE CITY SOLICITOR TO
COLLECT FROM CROWLEY & QUINN TWO HUNDRED
EIGHTY-SEVEN AND 50-100 DOLLARS (\$287.50), FOR QUARRY
RENT TO JUNE 1, 1903, AND ALSO AUTHORIZING THE MAK-
ING OF A NEW LEASE OF THE QUARRY NOW OCCUPIED
BY PATRICK CROWLEY TO SAID CROWLEY FOR THE TERM
OF FIVE YEARS FROM JUNE 1, 1903.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city solicitor is hereby instructed to collect from Crowley & Quinn of Concord, N. H., the sum of two hundred eighty-seven and 50-100 dollars (\$287.50) for the rent of quarry heretofore occupied by said Crowley & Quinn. Said amount to be in full for rent of

quarry to June 1, 1903, and upon the payment of said amount the city solicitor is hereby authorized to give said Crowley & Quinn, or the one paying it, a receipt in full for said quarry rent to June 1, 1903. If said Crowley & Quinn refuse or neglect to pay said sum by December 1, 1903, the city solicitor is hereby instructed to bring suit against them for the recovery of the quarry rent due from them to the date of bringing suit, and also to take such action as may be necessary for the city to get possession of the premises owned by it now occupied by said Crowley & Quinn.

Upon the payment of the above named amount by December 1, 1903, the mayor is hereby authorized to execute to Patrick Crowley a lease of the premises now occupied by him for the term of five years from June 1, 1903, at an annual rental of fifty dollars (\$50) per year, payable quarterly.

A JOINT RESOLUTION FOR THE PAYMENT OF INSPECTORS OF ELECTIONS AND SUPERVISORS OF CHECK-LISTS AT THE SPECIAL ELECTIONS HELD ON MARCH 10 AND MAY 12, 1903.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the supervisors of elections be paid for their services rendered during the special elections held on March 10 and May 12, 1903, as follows:

Inspectors on duty in Wards two, three, eight, and nine, to be paid the sum of five dollars (\$5) each, for each election at which they performed the duties of their office, and the inspectors in Wards one, four, five, six, and seven, to be paid the sum of seven dollars (\$7) each for each election at which they performed the duties of their office.

Sec. 2. That the supervisors of check-lists shall be paid for each election at which they performed the duties of their office the sums set against their respective wards as follows:

Sec. 3. That the sum of nine hundred twenty-six dollars (\$926), or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and hereby is, appropriated for the purpose of paying supervisors and inspectors as above.

The money hereby appropriated to be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY SOLICITOR TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH THE CONCORD ELECTRIC COMPANY FOR SERIES INCANDESCENT LIGHTS AND POLICE LIGHTS.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the mayor and city solicitor be, and hereby are, authorized to execute a contract with the Concord Electric company for series incandescent lights and police lights. Said contract to be made for such number of lights and for such period of time as may be agreed upon for the committee on lighting streets and said Concord Electric company. The price per light to be the amount agreed upon by the committee on lighting streets and said Concord Electric company, not exceeding eighteen dollars (\$18) per year, per light for 24-candle-power lights; twenty-four dollars (\$24) per year, per light, for 32-candle-power lights; and twenty-seven dollars (\$27) per year, per light, for 50-candle-power lights.

A JOINT RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING A SUM NOT EXCEEDING THIRTY DOLLARS (\$30) FOR DOUBLE WINDOWS FOR THE ALERT HOSE HOUSE.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a sum not exceeding thirty dollars (\$30) be, and the same is, hereby appropriated for the purpose of buying double windows for the Alert hose house. The sum hereby appropriated is to be expended under the direction of the committee on lands and buildings and shall be charged to the account of incidentals and land damages.

A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A TEMPORARY LOAN OF TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) FOR USE OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the city treasurer be, and hereby is, authorized to borrow on the credit of the City of Concord, a sum of money to the amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), to enable the water department to meet certain maturing obligations.

Sec. 2. This joint resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

A JOINT RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF FIFTY DOLLARS (\$50) TO BE EXPENDED IN REPAIRING AND PAINTING THE GOOD WILL HOSE HOUSE.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) be, and hereby is, appropriated for the purpose of repairing and painting the Good Will hose house. Said sum shall be charged to the account of incidentals and land damage and shall be expended under the direction of the committee on lands and buildings.

A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CHIEF OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT AND THE CITY SOLICITOR TO MAKE A CONTRACT WITH E. L. DAVIS FOR THE USE OF HORSES BY THE FIRE DEPARTMENT IN WARD ONE, FROM JANUARY 1, 1904, TO JANUARY 1, 1905.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the chief of the fire department and the city solicitor are hereby authorized to make a contract with E. L. Davis of said Concord for the use of three horses by the fire department in Ward one, from January 1, 1904, to January 1, 1905, at an expense of not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200).

Said contract shall provide that said Davis shall keep at least one pair of horses within hearing of the fire bell in Ward one at all times.

The amount paid to Davis on account of this contract shall be charged to the account of fire department.

A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF WATER PRECINCT BONDS TO THE AMOUNT OF THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$30,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF EXTENDING THE HIGH-PRESSURE WATER SERVICE TO WARD ONE IN CONCORD, N. H.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the treasurer of the City of Concord is hereby authorized to procure by loan on the credit of the city the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the purpose of extending the high-pressure water service to Ward one in said Concord.

Sec. 2. Bonds of said city shall be issued for said loan, signed by the mayor and countersigned by the city treasurer and sealed with the seal of the city, and said bonds shall in all respects comply with

the provisions of the "Municipal Bonds Act, 1895." Said bonds shall be payable to bearer and shall be dated January 1, 1904, and be numbered from one to forty-five inclusive. The bonds numbered from one to fifteen inclusive, shall be for the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, and shall be due and payable on the first day of January, 1923; the bonds numbered from sixteen to forty-five inclusive, shall be for the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) each, and shall be due and payable on the first day of January, 1924.

Said bonds shall have coupons attached for the semi-annual interest thereon, payable on the first days of January and July in each year during the term said bonds run at a rate of not exceeding $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum. Said coupons shall be signed by the treasurer of the city either in the original or fac-simile.

The interest on said bonds shall be paid at the office of the treasurer of the City of Concord or at the National Bank of Redemption, Boston, Massachusetts, on the first days of January and July in each year during the term of said bonds upon presentation of the interest coupons, and the bonds shall be paid at either of said places upon presentation at maturity.

Sec. 3. The city treasurer is hereby authorized to procure proposals for the sale of the bonds hereby authorized, and such bids as seem for the best interest of the city shall be accepted by him, provided the same are approved by the finance committee.

Sec. 4. All of said bonds owned by citizens of said Concord shall be exempt from taxation.

A JOINT RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO THE AUDITORIUM.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a joint committee consisting of the mayor and two aldermen, the president of the common council and one councilman be appointed by the mayor and the president of the common council to consider measures pertaining to the use and management of the auditorium and to report thereon to the city council.

A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CHIEF OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT TO PURCHASE A SET OF ATTACHABLE STEEL SLEIGH RUNNERS FOR THE "CHEMICAL," AND ALSO PURCHASE AND INSTALL A TRACK FOR THE "CHEMICAL."

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the chief of the fire department is hereby authorized to purchase a set of attachable steel sleigh runners for the "Chemical" at

an expense of not exceeding one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125), and to purchase and install at the central fire station a track for the "Chemical" to run on when equipped with runners at an expense of not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

The amount expended for the runners and track shall be charged to the account of fire department.

A JOINT RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR DEFICIENCIES IN THE SEVERAL DEPARTMENTS.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Concord, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION
OF
UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT, CONCORD, N. H., FOR THE
YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1904.

The school year of 1903-04 calls for but brief comment on the part of the board of education. For a detailed account of the various schools and their conduct reference should be had to the comprehensive report of the superintendent. Attention is also called to the annual report of the financial agent wherein may be found an exhibit of the income and the expenditures of the district during the past year. The number of scholars is larger than ever before and this notwithstanding the enlarged parochial school of the French Catholics. But the largest particular increase, as has been the case for two years last past, has been in the high school. A year ago the board called attention to existing conditions and ventured the hope that some radical measure of relief might be found. This year the extreme attendance has been 306 and is at the present time 295. Justifiable complaint was heard when the number of scholars reached 270 and it is not difficult to understand how well founded the complaint now is with the number in attendance increased a score or more. The high school question is one that perplexes every friend of the school and the question is rapidly assuming the form of a problem whose solution cannot be much longer delayed. The rapid increase of the high school is prevalent throughout New England. In New Hampshire this condition is conspicuously prominent as is shown in Manches-

ter, Nashua, Dover and Portsmouth, where overcrowding has compelled the people to construct large and convenient high school buildings. Unfortunately there is a difference between Concord and the cities mentioned that makes our situation all the more difficult. It is this: The increase of pupils in the other New Hampshire cities forced the people to abandon old and ill constructed buildings for modern buildings while in this city we are forced to sacrifice a beautiful and costly building erected but a few years ago. The board of education recognizes the perplexities of the situation and the obstacles surrounding it nor does the board deem it incumbent upon themselves to take measures to reform the existing situation until the citizens of the district have made known their deliberate judgment in the premises.

The new school on the Plains is nearly completed and presents one of the most attractive specimens of school architecture in the city. Its cost is about \$8,000. It is hardly necessary to say that this addition to the school houses of Union district meets an educational need of long standing. In seeking a name to give to the school the board was impressed with the propriety and the felicity as well of naming the building in memory of a woman who not only spent many years of her life in the vicinity in question but who won on the battlefields of her country an imperishable fame by ministering to the wounded and stricken—Harriet P. Dame. As was said in a former report so it may be said again, the collection of school buildings makes Union district the most beautiful and attractive in the state. But coincident with the increase in the number of school houses is a corresponding increase in the cost of their maintenance. Within five years we have built three new buildings besides adding two rooms to the Eastman school. The Dewey, the Rumford and the Harriet P. Dame, costing some \$63,000, replaced Bow Brook, the old Rumford and the Plains schools, whose value when left in the hands of the district did not amount

to \$1,000. Moreover in addition to the cost the three new buildings contain sixteen rooms as against seven in the old houses, which means just that number of new teachers.

Whoever questions the increasing expenses of the district will do well to study the changed conditions and additional burdens imposed on the district by the imperative demands of a progressive and constantly growing community.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND REPAIRS.

Concord, N. H., March, 1904.

The Committee on Buildings and Repairs respectfully submits the following report, summarizing the work done during the last year, 1903 and 1904, together with its suggestions for the coming year:

At the Eastman school, East Concord, the fourth room, hall and stairs were finished. In order to furnish seats old double desks were cut in two and refinished as single desks. The two upper rooms were equipped with slate blackboards, also slate blackboards put upon one side of each of the two lower rooms. In addition to the contract price of finishing the room it was found necessary to back plaster the walls of the new room, furnish double windows, new front doors, repair roof, repair and put in ventilators for water closets, provide curtains, teachers' desks, stove, etc.

This building should be reshingled and new floors provided for the lower rooms, also four new inside doors.

The basements should be cemented.

WEST CONCORD.

Owing to having forced the fires with wood last winter the furnaces of this building were burned beyond repair and owing to the shortage of money the furnaces were replaced by those of the same make, which have not proved a satisfactory investment.

TAHANTO SCHOOL.

Two hundred and fifty feet of iron sewer pipe was laid, connecting this building with the sewer. This work was necessitated by the old Akron sewer becoming completely choked with roots.

This building should be equipped with one furnace and a new outlet for the foul air shaft. The building is in a

district where there are many small children and the change in the air supply is important. The walls and wood work should also be put in a clean condition and building painted.

WALKER SCHOOL.

It was necessary to put new furnaces in this building and the change was made from wood-burning furnaces to coal. A new central iron stack was put in and heat supplied to halls. A new partition of laths and plaster was put in place of one of wood on third floor between the two school rooms.

This building, for its own protection, should be painted outside and in; the third floor never has been done over since the house was built.

The light in the two rooms on the third floor is very defective, this part of the building never having been intended for school rooms and the committee recommend that, if these rooms are to continue to be in use, something should be done to remedy this defect.

MERRIMACK AND PENACOOK SCHOOLS.

These buildings can be spoken of together in regard to repairs needed. It was the opinion of the committee when last inspected that, if for no other reason than that of safety, it was important that they should have either new plaster or steel ceilings.

Both of the buildings need new floors, especially the Penacook, and both buildings are in want of kalsomine and paint. The Penacook building was resingled this last summer.

COGSWELL SCHOOL.

The Cogswell was entirely renovated—roof repaired, building painted outside and inside, piazza repaired, desks scraped and revarnished. The furnace in this building was second-hand to start with and is burned out and must be replaced this coming summer. As it is now, it is both unsafe and impossible to heat the building in severe weather.

The New Rumford, Kimball, Dewey and Franklin are in good order. In these buildings the committee have

adopted the plan of going through each building each summer and retouching the worn and scratched places and in this way have kept them in good condition. The Cogswell will be added to this list and treated in the same way.

The sewing school on Union street was reopened and some repairs made. If this building is to be continued in use it will be necessary to remove the central partition and make one larger room, owing to the increase in the size of the school.

Not knowing the outcome of the high school question that building can be left until more important repairs are made.

During the fall and winter the committee have been erecting the new "Harriet P. Dame" school on the Plains, which it is hoped will be ready for occupancy during the spring term. The crowded condition of the Plains school made it necessary for the committee to find additional room and the state, through General Ayling, kindly offered the guard house, which was furnished and opened but which has been used only in moderate weather on account of our inability to heat the room.

The committee have furnished twenty-four new seats for the high school because of the crowded condition, some being new seats and desks, others old double desks made over.

Also forty-nine seats for the Dewey school have been supplied.

The committee also recommends that all desks and chairs be put in good order as fast as possible, having found that many desks have had nothing done in way of refinishing since purchased.

In the spring and also after heavy rains the basement of the Dewey school is flooded, owing to the character of the soil and the fact that there is no blind drain about the building. Sometimes there is several inches of water in the basement, which is causing the decay of the finish and makes it very inconvenient for the pupils. Some provision should be made to remedy this.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF AGENT.

Concord, N. H., March 7, 1904.

To the Board of Education of Union School District: I submit my second annual report as found in the following pages:

You will please note the overdraft of \$1,348.40.

If an ordinary year, there would have been a balance sufficiently large to cover the extraordinary bills for coal, hooks, extra janitors, etc. But, as you know, at the end of the last school calendar year it was deemed best to lengthen the fall term and shorten the Christmas vacation and winter term.

The financial year running as it does from annual meeting to annual meeting and the school calendar year from the first part of September to last of June brings the spring term of one school year and fall and winter term of another into one financial year. The change, therefore, put thirty-nine weeks' salaries into this financial year, an increase of one week, amounting to \$1,243.78. The terms were:

Spring, 1903, 13 weeks.

Fall, 1903, 15 weeks.

Winter, 1904, 11 weeks.

As the appropriation for salaries was based on the contracts made on the preceding July, plus the increased by rule, only a net appropriation was made for thirty-eight weeks.

To cover this I have paid the salaries due and carried the extraordinary bills as an overdraft to be cared for in the next year's appropriations.
