Voted, That the Interest arising from the Parsonage Fund be divided among the several religious denominations in town,

according to the proportion of taxes, as may be directed by each person when the Selectmen take the inventory ; and in case any person shall decline to direct to which Society his portion shall go, the Selectmen shall divide such person or person's portion equally among all the Societies.

Voted, To adopt the same part of the Police Laws of the town of Portsmouth, as was adopted the last year.

Voted, To adopt all the laws of this State defining the powers and duties of Firewards and other persons in certain cases, except that part of the 10th section of the law passed Dec. 16, 1828, which says, " and every such house or building, which has eight fire-places, shall be provided with four such buckets, and every such house or building which has more than eight fire-places shall be provided with six such buckets," provided that every such house or building which has eight or more fire places shall be provided with three such buckets, and that the inhabitants of this town living more than half a mile in any direction from a line beginning at the old north meeting house, and running southerly through main street to Concord Bridge, and the inhabitants living more than half a mile in any direction from George W. Brown's house in the west village, and the inhabitants living more than three quarters of a mile in any direction from Stephen Ambrose's store, in the east village, be exempted from the whole of the said 10th section.

Voted, To dismiss the 13th article.

Voted, That the Selectmen be authorized to make such appropriation for removing, enlarging and repairing Engine House No. 2 as they shall think equitable and proper.

Voted, That Isaac Farnum, Isaac Dow, and Jacob Hoit, be a committee to take into consideration the question of forming a new school district, from districts No. 1, and No. 23, as described in the 15 Art. in the warrant, and report to the Selectmen.

Voted, That Richard Bradley, Robert Davis, and Jonathan Eastman, be a committee to ascertain if there are any lands unsold, in the town of Concord, belonging to School or Parsonage land, and report the facts to the town.

Voted, That every Soldier who shall furnish to the Selectmen satisfactory evidence that he has performed military duty the past year whenever required by his officers, being equipped in the usual manner at the second training, and fully equipped at the inspection of the company, and who have not been paid, shall receive one dollar from the town treasury, and that the certificate, under oath of the officers, be deemed satisfactory evidence.

Voted, That the further sum of three hundred dollars be raised to defray the necessary charges and expenses of the town the current year.

Voted, That the sum of four hundred dollars, of the money raised for the support of Schools the ensuing year, be divided equally among the several school districts.

Voted, That the Poor House or the town farm be a House of Correction, and that the Overseer of said farm be Keeper of the same.

Voted, That the school district on the dark plain be allowed ten dollars of the money of the town not otherwise appropriated.

Voted, That the Selectmen cause the warrant for the next annual meeting, to be published in the N. H. Statesman, N. H. Courier, and N. H. Patriot, printed in this town.

Voted, That the selectmen receive proposals for collecting taxes, and appoint such person or persons collectors as they shall think necessary and proper.

Voted, That this meeting be dissolved.

AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILITIA.

[PUBLISHED IN PURSUANCE OF A VOTE OF THE TOWN.]

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened,* That it shall be the duty of the commanding officers of the several companies who are liable to do military duty by the laws of this State, some time in the month of October in each year, to make out a list or roll of the men belonging to his company, and who have during the year previous to making said roll, faithfully and promptly done and performed, to the full satisfaction of the commissioned officers of the company, all the duties which they were required by law, as soldiers, to perform; having their arms and equipments in perfect order, without any deficiencies whatever, and having at all times yielded due obedience to the officers of the company.

SEC. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That it shall be duty of the commanding officer of the company to make a certificate on the back of said roll that the within contains only the names of such men as have the past year performed military duty agreeably to the provisions of the first section of this act; which certificate shall be sworn to and immediately be deposited in the office of the Selectmen of the town within whose limits the men whose names are contained therein may reside. And it shall be the duty of the Selectmen of the several towns, who may receive such roll and certificate as aforesaid, to pay or cause to be paid out of the treasury of their respective towns the sum of one dollar to each soldier whose name may be found on said roll as aforesaid.

SEC. 3. *Be it further enacted,* That any officer who shall be guilty of making a false return, or who shall return the names of men who have not performed military duty agreeably to the provisions of this act, shall forfeit and pay for the use of the towns where said false returns shall have been made, the sum of five dollars for each name so falsely returned, to be recovered in any court competent to try the same.

SEC. 4. *Be it further enacted,* That it shall be the duty of the commanding

officers of the several companies of Infantry, to enroll all able-bodied men within the limits of their respective companies, between the ages of forty and forty-five years, and to make return of them at the annual inspection in May as conditional exempts. And said conditional exempts shall not be liable to do military duty in any case whatever, unless in cases of invasion or insurrection, whereby the militia shall be ordered out by the commander in chief, in which case they shall be liable to perform military duty in the same way and manner as other soldiers are now by law liable.

SEC. 5. *Be it further enacted*, That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act, be and the same are hereby repealed.

The SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE respectfully submit the following

REPORT.

Summer schools were kept in nearly or quite all the districts. The terms of seventeen of the schools averaged about twelve weeks each, and reported 539 scholars. Several of the schools were of a high order, and the remainder were as satisfactory as in former years.

From a tabular view of the winter schools, which is appended to this report, it appears that the whole number of scholars which attended the nineteen schools reported, is 917. Of these, 631 were present when the schools were examined, and probably constituted nearly the average number of regular attendants. Of those examined, 64 read in words of from one to four syllables, 120 in easy reading, 447 read with more or less facility in the higher order of class books. The writers numbered 250; 187 studied mental, and 142 written Arithmetic; 187 studied Geography; 137, Grammar, and 27 were pursuing the higher branches of an English education.

The terms of the schools ranged from seven to twenty weeks, making an average of nearly twelve each; and a total of two hundred and fifteen weeks kept on the public money. And your committee are gratified to be able to add, that several districts have lengthened their school terms, from two to six weeks, either by subscription in money, or by finding wood, and boarding the teacher, so that the whole of the town money might go directly to the purposes of instruction. These instances are deemed worthy of general imitation, especially by those districts which receive a small amount of public money. In district No. 15, a new brick school house has been erected, greatly to the advantage of the district. And we may add, that all the school houses in town are now in good order, except No. 3, in the west village.

The character of the schools has varied somewhat, as in former years. A few instances of falsehood, profanity, and turbulency, have come to our knowledge; while in most cases, the reports have been favorable to the morals and docility of the scholars. The order and progress in knowledge in several of the schools have been highly flattering. Of these, we notice particularly, without designing to disparage others, No. 3, taught by Mr. David Cross, No. 4, by Mr. Nathan K. Abbot, the fall term in No. 10, by Mr. Henry L. Low, No. 11, by Dea. J. Moulton, No. 13, by Mr. True Brown, No. 21, by Mr. Thomas Whidden, No. 23, and east end of No. 1, by Mr. John McAlpine, and Nos. 8 and 9, kept by Mr. William H. Smart, the latter of which is not yet closed.

In conclusion, we would suggest the desirableness of a wise caution on the part of district agents, in the employment of teachers. The law requires, that each teacher shall receive a certificate of his qualifications, from the superintending committee, *before* being employed; and that the certificate shall be renewed every year. Those who taught the winter schools in Nos. 10 and 23 totally disregarded this law, having *never* been examined by the committee. And the teachers in Nos. 1, 4, 6, 7, 8, and 13, did not apply for a renewal of papers. Thus the formalities of the statute on a point which is deemed highly important in its proper operation, were disregarded by ten of our schools. If no evil has come to any of these schools already, by this neglect, its tendency is to fill the schools with teachers unfit for their business. And then the engagement, and actual employment of teachers, as has been sometimes the case, before they have been examined, is adapted greatly to embarrass the duties of your committee.

When a teacher comes before us, under contract to keep a particular school, or having

already commenced keeping, and we find his literary qualifications to answer the law, we do not deem ourselves competent to refuse a certificate, even though the dullness of the eye, and an awkward mopishness of demeanor may furnish the most convincing evidence, that he lacks the practical wisdom, affability, decision and energy, indispensable in a good instructor; such persons should be kindly advised to seek some other employment, and never be sent into a school merely because they will *possibly do*, and can be had cheap. Six weeks good management and instruction is cheaper and better, at the same price, than three months school under a master incompetent to manage, and unapt to teach.

With proper regard to the selection of teachers, together with a punctual and steady attendance of the scholars, during school term, and the union and coöperation of the parents in the districts, there is good reason to hope that the rising generation will be prepared for an intelligent discharge of the duties of life.
