During the year there has been a road laid out across the pasture of the Farm, and a number of house lots sold to the amount of about \$2,000 00; but owing to the rise in value of real estate in this vicinity, your Committee did not deem it advisable to reduce the valuation of the farm.

## CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord :*

In accordance with an ordinance of the city of Concord, I herewith submit my Annual Report of the affairs of the Fire Department for the year ending February 1, 1866.

There have been eleven fires and alarms, viz :

February 1, 1865. Fire at the residence of George Clough, Esq., corner of Warren and Merrimack sts. Loss, \$6,000 00. Insured.

April 1. Alarm from fire at the residence of B. Biddle on State street. Damage trifling.

July 15. Fire at tannery of Messrs. Robinson & Sons. Loss \$25,000; insured for \$18,000.

July 17. Fire at house of Mrs. Sawyer, on Spring street, occupied by E. P. Sawtelle and John Carter. Damage to house \$500; insured. To furniture \$200; not insured.

August 1. Fire at carpenter shop of Clifford & Currier, rear of Stickney's (old) Block. Damage to tools and building \$600. No insurance. The fire extended to the workshop of Robinson & Brothers, which was damaged to the amount of about \$400. Insured.

Aug. 5. Alarm by lightning striking the house of W. P. Ford on Franklin street, occupied by John Kimball. Damage \$25.

Aug. 6. Fire in old court house building rear of Stickney Block, in box of shavings. Slight damage.

Sept 2. Fire at State Prison. Damage \$50.

Sept. 26. Fire at American House stable—hay in stall. Damage slight.

Oct. 18. Fire at rum shop of John Wall, on West street. Building owned by B. F. Duncklee. Loss, \$500.

Fire at building of Northern Railroad. Extinguished by city and railroad watchmen without a general alarm.

It will be seen by the foregoing, that the fires and alarms have been much less frequent than for some years past. The principal losses were the elegant residence of George Clough, Esq., and the tannery of Robinson & Sons. Both of which have been rebuilt.

The deficiency of water and the inadequacy of reservoirs is every day becoming more apparent. Probably no city in New England is so poorly situated in its natural advantages of supply as ours. With the single exception of the large reservoir in the yard of the High School, and its connecting cisterns, little or no dependence can be placed upon others. The latter, during the fall and winter, owing to the peculiar state of the ground through which alone they are all filled, have been rendered unreliable and almost worthless. The necessity of an abundant supply of *running water*, carried to all parts of the compact portion of the city, is manifestly required, and I would recommend its introduction for fire purposes, from Little or Long Pond, as early as our pecuniary condition will admit. It would give a full head to the roofs of the highest buildings, and afford an ample and sure supply.

Another important and perhaps more immediate object which I have no doubt it would be for the interest of the city to obtain, is the procurement of another Steamer, one of the second class, playing two streams, much lighter than the present one, but corresponding in its hose and fittings. I am decidedly of the opinion that the time has arrived when the interests of the city imperatively demand it, and in this I am supported by the unanimous concurrence of the Board of Engineers. The rates of insurance in Concord, from the causes enumerated, are much higher than in corresponding inland cities, and this alone, to say nothing of the large pecuniary losses to citizens constantly occurring, should induce us to take decisive action in this matter.

The Board of Engineers have the subject now under consideration and will, at an early date after the induction to office of the incoming City Government, present a full and complete plan for a new organization in the City Precinct, of a Steam Fire Department exclusively. We have sufficient men in service, and with proper means at their command, they will always be found ready to answer calls to duty.

The Chief Engineer is under renewed obligations to the Board of Assistant Engineers, the various Fire Companies and the Fire

Police, for the promptness and energy they have manifested during the past year.

It will be seen by the above that the number of arrests during the past year largely exceeds any other year in the history of the Police department of this City. This of course can be accounted for or attributed to the return of the different regiments discharged from military service, whose ranks have been filled from time to time by bounty jumpers and substitutes obtained from other cities and States. I am happy to say that they have not found our city a very pleasant place for their nefarious operations, and very rapidly departed to other places where they hoped to meet with a better reception.

I think I can safely congratulate your honorable body and our citizens generally upon the successful workings of the Police organization, and I believe it will not suffer by comparison with the Police of any other city, (according to the number of men on duty,) in the manner in which they have performed their duties. The duty of a Police Officer cannot be thoroughly understood except by long experience and practice. So far as my duties are concerned I can only say that I have endeavored to perform them according to the best of my ability, though I have not been able to accomplish all I wished, and perhaps have fallen short of the expectancy of some. In conclusion I would return my sincere thanks to your honorable body and the citizens of Concord for the confidence they have reposed in me.

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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

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During the past year, *two hundred and fifty-two* volumes have been added to the Public Library. Of these, *one hundred and ninety-two* were obtained by purchase, and *sixty* by donation. Of the volumes received by donation, Hon. Edward H. Rollins presented *twenty-three*, the Unitarian Publication Society *thirty-two*, Mrs. J. A. Eames *four*, and Moody Kent, Esq., *one*. The sum expended in the purchase of books has been \$273.48. The number of subscribers has been *six hundred and ninety-eight*.

The Library has suffered somewhat during the past year, from inconvenience of location, it having been temporarily removed to less advantageous quarters, to accommodate State Officers pending the completion of the remodeled State House. This inconvenience will be obviated early the coming year.

We gratefully acknowledge the generous benefaction of the late *Gardner Parker Lyon*, who bequeathed to the City the sum of *one thousand dollars*, the interest of which is to be annually applied to the purchase of books for the Public Library. This trust fund has been assumed by the city in a recent ordinance, and the Library will at once begin to realize the benefits of the considerate bequest, which will be a perpetual blessing both to the memory of the giver and to the community in which he lived his well-spent life.

The annual appropriation made from the City Treasury for some years past, for the benefit of the Library, ought to be increased. The sum of *three hundred dollars* has not been, for two years past, and probably will not be, for some years to come, adequate to supply the necessary books.

Commending this indispensable institution to the liberal favor of the City Council and to the confidence and support of our people, we close, by referring, for information as to the financial condition of the Library, to the report of the Treasurer herewith presented.
