#### EXTENSIONS, IMPROVEMENTS, AND STATISTICS.

A new 4-inch pipe has been laid from Clinton street through Fruit to Pleasant street, a distance of 2900 feet. A new hydrant has been located at the corner of Clinton and Fruit streets, and another near the residence of William W. Critchett on Fruit street.

From Warren street, northerly in Giles street, a distance of 860 feet, a new 4-inch pipe has been laid so that families on Giles and the westerly part of School street can be supplied from the works instead of from the spring near Little Pond road. A new hydrant has been located on Giles, near School street.

The engineers of the Fire Department have suggested that there was not suitable protection to the large number of wood-

en buildings situated east of Main street, between the Eagle and the Phenix hotels. CITY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.  

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*To the City Council:*

As you are aware, most of the duties devolving upon the city physician during the past year were performed by my lamented predecessor, the late Dr. Marden. Since assuming the duties of the office, December 3, 1885, seven different patients have been treated. I have made nine house visits, and have given five prescriptions at my office.

Knowing so little of what was done by the city physician during eleven months of the year, I have nothing of interest to offer. But perhaps it may not be improper for me to say a word of the late city physician, Dr. Sumner D. Marden. He was born in this city September 17th, 1852, and died November 27th, 1885. He graduated from Dartmouth Medical College in the class of 1883 as one of the class officers, and soon after opened an office in this city. In January, 1885, he was chosen city physician. Owing to a variety of causes, among others the threatened attack of small pox and the vaccinations which necessarily followed, the duties were more arduous than for several years previous; but they were thoroughly and satisfactorily performed. Although a young man in the practice of his profession, he had won the respect and confidence of the community to an enviable degree, and his death is mourned by all. He was a member of the Centre District and New Hampshire State Medical societies.
